Getting Downtown

Taking the Light Rail:

Depart from Dry Creek Station on E or F line,
40 minute trip, \$4.50 per person each way

Driving:

30 minute trip
Open Lots, Meters, and Garages available
Validation available at certain downtown destinations

16th Street Mall

Built in 1982, the Mall is a tree-lined, pedestrian promenade of that runs through the center of Downtown and is lined with outdoor cafes, renovated historic office buildings, sparkling glass-walled skyscrapers, shops, restaurants and retail stores. Numerous fountains and plazas offer a variety of daily special events and entertainers. Free shuttle buses cruise the mile-long Mall seven days a week, between Union Station on the North West end and The Capitol Building on the South East end. VISIT DENVER's Visitor Information Center is located at 16th & California on the 16th Street Mall.

B-Cycle

Denver B-cycle is large-scale municipal bike sharing system. Dozens of special bike stations (B-stations) are available in the downtown Denver area. Denver B-cycle members will be able to pick up one of the red bikes at any B-station and drop it off at any B-station. Once you've paid your modest membership fee, you can take an unlimited number of rides, and there is no charge for the first 30 minutes of every ride. You can join online and purchase an access pass, or 24 hour passes are available at the B-cycle station.

The Golden Triangle

Bordered by Lincoln, Colfax and Speer, Denver's Golden Triangle neighborhood is brimming with galleries, museums, restaurants, live music venues, theatres and remarkable architecture. We boast many of Denver's landmarks including the Denver Art Museum, History Colorado Center, The Denver Public Library, Byers-Evans House Museum and the Clyfford Still Museum.

LoDo

(Lower Downtown)

This is the lower downtown area of Denver, Colorado, the oldest and original settlement of the city of Denver. It is a mixed-use historic district, known for its nightlife, and serves as an example of success in urban reinvestment and revitalization. Popular destinations in this area are the Wynkoop Brewery and Pub, Coors Field, Pepsi Center, Children's Museum of Denver, and Elitch Gardens Amusement Park.

Larimer Square and Writer's Square

Larimer Square was the first revitalization of an historic neighborhood in America and opened in 1969. Complete with glittering lights strung over the entire block, the area is charming and elegant with a nightlife that defines hip urban renewal. The 18 shops and boutiques carry more than 200 fashion lines from the fashion capitals of the world. Men and women seeking unique clothing and accessories need only to spend an afternoon in Larimer Square, and some of the city's top chefs call this block home. Writer Square has always been a great place for a nice, Old World-style meal nestled into the nooks of this pedestrian shopping center downtown. The evocative aromas of garlic and cigar tobacco and the profusion of gas lamps and flowers has always been guaranteed to transport diners to another world.
