Caleb Burns is a partner at Wiley Rein, where he focuses on advising participants in the political process on compliance with all aspects of political law including campaign finance, government ethics, and lobbying. Mr. Herring got his start in public service as the town attorney for Lovettsville. He later was elected to the Loudoun County Board of Supervisors. Prior to serving as attorney general, he served eight years in the Senate of Virginia, representing parts of Loudoun and Fairfax Counties. Mr. Herring was the first state attorney general to argue successfully in federal court that same-sex marriage bans violate the 14th Amendment right to due process and equal protection.
